

Trinity Gardens School, built on the traditional lands of the Kaurna Plains people, was opened in 1899 as the Wellington Road School. It was named after the major road it stood on, now known as Portrush Road. The school was considered one of South Australia's major schools outside the city of Adelaide with an initial enrolment of 257 students, 121 boys and 136 girls.

The first Principal was Mr John Moyes. Although discipline was often strictly enforced in this period using the cane, Mr Moyes did not believe in corporal punishment and instead retained order through encouraging students to act morally.

Until the 1920s the principals of the school lived on-site in a residence on the corner of the school grounds. In the 1920s this building was converted to classrooms for the 'infant school'. Today this building is known as 'The Cottage'. The original classrooms were in the Wellington building. The Jones building which today houses the office and five classrooms was constructed in 1938 and 1939 to hold more of the growing infant school. Owing to the large number of students and limited space, class sizes could be as large as 40 students to each teacher. In 1944 some land was purchased from the neighbouring Devitt family and was converted to an oval and playing area for the children.

In the 1920s, enrolments grew rapidly and a new school was built in the neighbouring suburb of St Morris in 1926. As houses were built and migrant families arrived to settle in the area in the 1950s and early 60s, timber transportable classrooms were built at both schools.

In 1965 the school was renamed Trinity Gardens Primary School after the suburb in which it's located. More classrooms were added in the 1970s, including an open plan classroom block and the Child Parent Centre, today the Early Learning Centre. Enrolments at this time decreased due to an aging population and Trinity Gardens Primary School and the St Morris School were amalgamated at the Trinity Gardens site in 1991. The school adopted the name of Devitt Avenue School at this time. The sale of the St Morris site enabled the Department of Education and Children's Services to spend over \$2 million between 1992 and 1994 on upgrading the school, with specific attention directed to the establishment of a unit for students with severe and multiple disabilities – the St Morris Unit.

The school celebrated its centenary in 1999 with a series of well attended events and produced a book entitled "Slate to Silicon" that documents the history of Wellington Road School and its transition to Devitt Ave School.

The school has a proud history and it is interesting to note that in times gone by the school boasted a wonderful vegetable garden; we currently make the same boast. In the late 1960s the school had 500 students and we are well over that number

now. Some families currently enrolled are the third generation attending the school. Steiner Stream was added in 2006.

In the year 2000 the school community supported a change in name to Trinity Gardens School.

2022 has seen some major building works completed and about to be completed with an upgrade of the School Office, including a new entrance on Jones Ave, and a \$6M classroom build located at the eastern end of the school overlooking Devitt Oval.



Dear Trinity Gardens Students, Staff & Families

2022 started slowly with continuing interruptions from COVID-19 but has progressed well with school activities recommencing and the school being able to welcome the community back into the grounds to reconnect. The school leadership team in its third year has been able to build on the learning and educational methods which commenced last year under the excellent guidance of our principal, Brenton Conradi. There continues to be many challenges and interruptions with the upgrades and building work happening, but students and teachers have been flexible and resilient delivering an excellent year of learning for all.



The new and improved office has been fantastic for parents, students, and staff! Having a clear entrance to the school from Jones Avenue has improved the look of the school and made access for all so much easier. For the Governing Council, the new meeting room has

given us a place to hold our meetings in a professional environment, be able to utilise technology better and enable dial-ins for members who cannot attend in person.

At the AGM this year there were several new members voted onto Governing Council, who have all contributed to great discussions and excellent ideas to help build the school, especially with the Steiner Stream. The Steiner stream is unique to our school and showcases how Steiner education methods can suit children to be the best they can be, and we are looking at ways to increase our enrolments. I thank all the council members for their contributions this year. One of the most exciting events for this year was that we were finally able to hold the School Fair. Thanks to Karen, Helen, Nat, Serafina and committee for all their efforts in organising the fair and leading all our fundraising efforts. It is hoped that along with contributions from the OSHC budget, we will be able to commence the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden program in the near future. Our SAKG committee has been working hard toward this too, garnering much sponsorship through products and items for use in our kitchen and garden once it's up and running.

With fewer COVID-19 restrictions this year, extracurricular activities could return in full. The 2022 Wakakirri performance was once again brilliant with the full allotment of 90 students participating. The Festival of Music Choir performed fabulously along with TGS soloists and representatives in the dance troupe, including a number of TGS old scholars! The Pedal Prix was a standout finishing as National Winners of the Primary School mixed category, fastest lap winner, and won the series award for juniors for three categories. Amazing effort by all involved! Our debating team fought hard and completed against high school students this year, giving them valuable experience for entering high school themselves. Having these extracurricular activities available for students enables them to learn, grow and make new friendships across year levels and streams. Thanks to Brenton and staff for continuing to support these activities.

The school also performed well in the SAPSASA sporting arena. Trinity Garden School won three District Shields this year for Swimming, Athletics and Cross Country – an amazing achievement! In netball our girls' team of Year 6s finished second in the state, with only a few goals in it! The girls' football team also made it to the second round and had five representatives in the Torrens River District team. Students participated in boys' basketball, soccer and cricket, enjoying themselves immensely, with the soccer team making it to the second round. Well done to all our school representatives for SAPSASA and also to all students who participated in school sport this year. Special mention to Lara G who represented the state in both Basketball and Football in the State under 12 teams!

The Steiner Community enjoyed fewer restrictions which made holding their much-loved Autumn, Winter and Spring festivals easier. The Steiner music program continues to produce some wonderful talent, which was able to be showcased at the Trinity Gardens Music night this year along with many talented mainstream students. Great to see this night return!

We are all looking forward to the graduation celebrations for the Year 6s in term 4 as they move on to High School. Thanks to all students who took on leadership positions and led the school this year. Goodbye and good luck to families and children not returning to TGS next year, which includes my family. The time passes so quickly, I can't believe we will no longer have children at the school. Best wishes to all remaining and new families joining the school community in 2023. It is a fabulous school and with the new buildings opening for next year and the current leadership the children's experiences can only improve!

A lead teacher at my site supported me throughout my Journey using clear success criteria. His coaching allowed a high level of differentiation across the curriculum with student input (individualised, sequential success criteria). He motivated me to develop an inclusive and balanced curriculum which is skillsbased with multiple entry and eait points and provides a variety of personalised learning opportunities. Io develop students' abilities.

Throughout Semester 1 in my certification journey, my students became highly independent at managing their own learning, striving for improvement through the scaffolds implemented in class.



At the beginning of 2021, teaching staff Raj Bhatti, Christine McCauley and Amy Hammond began the process of becoming certified as Highly Accomplished and Lead Teachers through the Department for Education. Stage 1 of this process was the submission of an individual portfolio of our work from the last five years, with evidence meeting the 37 descriptors within the broader areas of 'Professional Knowledge', 'Professional Practice' and 'Professional Engagement'. Following success at the portfolio stage, an assessor then came to our site to observe our practice in the classroom and speak to colleagues.

This process enabled us to receive feedback on our practice and have our practice evaluated by nationally trained assessors who are external to the school.

At each stage of the certification process James Ellis, a certified Lead Teacher and assessor, supported and mentored us all. He provided invaluable insight into selecting the best evidence of our work, writing annotations for each piece of evidence and preparation for the assessor observation. This process concluded in term 4 of 2021, with all three of us being successful in our certification. At the beginning of 2022, we were all able to celebrate together at the ceremony at the Adelaide Convention Centre with Education Minister Blair Boyer presenting us with our certificates.

As the St Morris Unit Coordinator my responsibilities include line managing 5 teachers, 2 Special Educators -Conductive Education, 11 School Support staff and staff from the Women's & Children's Hospital Access Assistant Program. My role includes:

- overseeing the Students with Disability Water Safety Program for enrolled swimmers and the Students with Disability (SwD) Transport Assistance program
- managing SMU facilities (in consultation with Principal)

- sourcing and facilitating Professional Learning for SMU staff
- sitting on the Special Options Placement panel
- supporting teachers to apply for and review Inclusive Education Support Program (IESP) funding
- induction for all new staff
- inclusion in the mainstream
- overseeing timetables
- SMU enrolment pack development
- managing transition visits for newly enrolled and future students
- providing Instructional Leadership (classroom observations) to the teaching team
- certifying beginning teacher portfolios
- representing SMU at relevant meetings or conferences

In 2022 we welcomed Daniela Weyers as part of the SMU teaching team, we welcomed back Rachel Noolan from Maternity Leave in Term 3, celebrated Sue Cox and Karina Nigro being appointed as permanent and full time SSO2s in the Unit. We also welcomed a new Reception class to the St Morris Unit!

Our focus this year in Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) has been consistency and collaboration across year levels. We are very proud of all our teachers for their commitment to enacting our Site Improvement Plan (SIP) priorities and ensuring that a teaching and learning cycle is implemented that includes pre and post assessment, moderation, intentional check-ins with students to determine next teaching steps and feedback to move student learning forward.











Getting to know characters

Teachers have been using the new Department for Education units which have been written by teachers for teachers using current evidence based research.

> The Reception teachers have embedded a new systematic synthetic phonics approach called InitiaLit.





All teachers have participated in professional learning about learning intentions and differentiated success criteria to support all diverse learners in the classroom.



Classes have been co-constructing success criteria to enable students to have ownership over their learning by knowing what they need to do to achieve their next steps.





We have both thoroughly enjoyed working with teachers and getting into classes through coaching. Lisa has focused on the implementation of InitiaLit and the Department for Education units. Tarnya has focused on learning intentions and differentiated success criteria, visual displays and feedback.



Intervention is part of tracking and our monitoring process. We have targeted intervention based on the students needs and next steps in learning. Ongoing assessment and cycles in phonics, reading and writing have allowed for students to receive the support that they need at the time.









Students have been setting and reviewing goals for English. It has been great to see students being able to articulate their goals and know how to achieve them.



Moderation of all student samples has been conducted for each text type taught. This informs next teaching steps and students knowing what they need to do to improve.





Steiner Festivals

Festivals play an essential role for the school's Steiner community. Celebrating the seasonal festivals brings a sense of rhythm and anticipation. Children build their sense of time, as year-by-year their class takes a new role in the festivals. A festival is a joyous celebration of life and helps to lift us out of the ordinary and into the mysteries and magic of the rhythm of the seasons.



The Autumn Harvest Festival sees a bounteous gathering of mother nature's treasures and the celebration of the "Michaelic" spirit as we move into the cooler months.

The Winter Festival celebrates solstice and incorporates beautiful lanterns that the children have prepared and decorated. The community shares warming soup before gathering to sing and watch the lanterns paraded through the darkness. The Winter Festival helps remind us of our ability to bring light into darker times.

The Spring Festival is celebrated with colour and dancing. This cheerful event sees the children weaving wreaths of flowers to wear in their hair. Class 4 children have practiced together to perfect the dancing of the maypole. Then families join together for a community picnic.

Trinity Gardens Early Learning Centre

A community of learners: collaborating, creating and learning with purpose and enthusiasm

In 2022 our staff and children have engaged in inquiry based learning. We know that an effective way for early years educators to engage and promote both academic and intellectual learning is to integrate learning into the curriculum by using an inquiry approach (a community of learners).

Children have worked in small groups with a common interest and are supported to work collaboratively and learn from one another. Inquiry allows children to enter the experience at their level of development and to be supported to extend their learning in an individualised way. It strongly supports the sites improvement goal for 2022, 'to extend children's speaking and listening skills'.

This year children have explored various inquiries where they have had the opportunity to work collaboratively and creatively with one another, problem solving whilst deepening their skills, knowledge and dispositions for learning.

We have seen our capable young children engaging with the big questions and offering solutions that are intelligent, designed, tested and shared with others.




